Executive Summary

Late Annasaheb P.S.Wadile Arts College, Thalner is run by the Annapurnadevi Vidya Prasark Sanstha, Thalner, Tal. Shirpur Dist – Dhule. The founder President of the Sanstha was Late Annasaheb Pitamber Shankar Wadile, the renowned educationist of the Shirpur Tahsil. The Directors and Office bearers of the Sanstha are highly qualified and with the educationist view.

Late Annasaheb P. S. Wadile Arts College was established in 2000, (at the time named as Arts College) affiliated to the North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The college has single stream with as enrollment of 208 students for the current academic year. The college is situated in the Tapi valley and rural area of the North Maharashtra. The college is spread over 1.25 acre land at the foot of the Thalner fort and right bank of the Tapi River. The large numbers of students of the college are from rural area and from the farming and farm working families. The most of the students are the first generation from their families, who avail the facility of the higher education. The more than 50% female students are enrolled of total intact. Most of the students come from rural area and majority of them are the first generation learners. The Vision and Mission of the College are thus envisaged on local needs covering the demands and the issues of social concern. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was constituted in the College as per the guidelines of NAAC on 30th Aug. 2015.The College is Non-Permanent affiliation to University and the lack of 2 (f) and 12(B) status have affected our overall development, particularly the infrastructural facilities and funds for research. Academic courses meet the demands of the students and prepare the students to contribute to nation building and to meet global challenges.

The College offers U.G. programme only, the conventional stream B.A. In this programme Marathi, Hindi, History and Geography are taught at Special Level and English, Opt.English Economics, Political Science, Defence & Strategic Studies and Psychology are taught at General Level. The academic courses meet the demand of the students and prepare the students to contribute to nation building and to meet global challenges.

The college admissions are granted on the come first serve first basis as per the University rules. Reservation Policy is followed. The College maintains complete transparency in the admission process and does not accept any donation. In addition to the regular lecture method, teaching – learning process is enriched through interactive sessions, projects, ICT enabled teaching, field visit etc.

The students' progress is monitored trough regular class tests, tutorials. Regular feedback about teaching – learning process is obtained for taki-ng quality enhancement initiatives. The results stand testimony to the emphasis laid on effective teaching and learning processes.

The staff members regularly update their knowledge and skills by attending / organizing workshops, seminars, conferences, refresher courses, orientation programmes etc. Various university level workshop/seminars are organized for students and staff. The college has taken initiatives to promote research culture resulting in several faculty members pursuing research leading to Ph.D., and publishing research paper/ books. The institute has established linkage with the other institute. The College also encourages non – teaching staff to update their knowledge by attending workshops, seminars etc.

The College has a vibrant work- culture and a holistic approach to education is encouraged. The College is grooming the students to be realistic and aware of their social responsibilities. The simultaneous development of the intellectual, physical, cultural and faculties of the students is achieved through various academic, co- curricular and extracurricular activities. The students participate enthusiastically and excel in sports and cultural activities. The students participate NSS, Student Welfare Department, Red Ribbon Club, Yuwati Sabha units of the college. The College has counseling Cell to make available the employment opportunities, Sports Department to develop the sport culture, Grievance Redressal Cell and Sexual Harassment Cell of the college ensures gender and social equity and provides security, help, support and guidance whenever required.

Majority of the students in the college belong to lower and lower middle class strata. The institution ensures opportunity to all by implementing reservation Policy of the Government and makes available the scholarships for backward class students. In the instructions are imparted through Marathi medium also, providing an opportunity for higher education to students coming from neighboring rural areas. Financial assistance in the froOm fees waiver (full and partial), installment facility and books are provided to students. The institution attempts to develop graduates as well balanced, ethical and socially responsible global contribution in Nation Building work force. An attempt is made to not only make these graduates constructively participate in the development of the institution, but also aid the continuity of the process.

The College aspires to be nodal center catering to diverse need of society. The Vision and Mission statement and Objectives of the college focus on achieving all round development of the students. All educational activities organized in the college are student centric. **"Developing human values and pursuit responsible, secular, democratic, citizen of healthy minds"**

A. CriterionWise Analysis

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The academic programmes of the College are in accordance with its vision and mission. The single faculty college aims to avail the higher education to the rural students at their grass root by keeping in view the employment demands and need of entrepreneurship development. The College has introduced three years undergraduate courses with ten subjects at general level since 2001-2002 and the special subjects like Marathi, Hindi, Geography and History from the academic year 2002-03. The college is affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The curriculum and academic programmes strictly follow the rules and regulation laid down by the Parent University. The college carried out the action plan with the help of teaching and non-teaching faculties. To ensure institution's goals and objectives regarding curriculum aspects, faculty members are promoted to attend departmental conferences, syllabus framing workshops. Evaluation of students is done according to cumulative grade point average system.

The college takes efforts of uplift of students for creating awareness to improve their status in the educational, social, cultural and economical fields by supplementing enrichments programmes. The organization of various programmes by Women Personality Development cell on Women

Empowerment, Human Rights, Personality Development, Anty Tobacco Day etc. have regular occurrence to create an in-built value orientation of the students. For future developments, we would be careful about facilities of dual degree programme, introducing new courses, formal feedback on curriculum system etc.+6

Criterion II: Teaching – Learning and Evaluation

The college has maintained transparency in the admission process by publishing intake capacity and admission schedule of each and every programme. It is notified on blackboard, notice boards, and college prospectus. Total transparency is ensured in the admission process according to the rules and regulations provided by The State Govt. and University. Admissions are given to the students on first come first serve basis. Admission is given to all the eligible students adopting constitutional rules. The college has organized many programs to sensitize the faculty members and students on gender inclusion and environment. The institution fulfils the educational and learning needs of advanced learners.

The students are given adequate counseling regarding academic activities. The college offers lectures and guidance through competitive exam guidance centre for entry in services. Programmes are organized to sensitize the staff and students on several occasions such as Environment Day,Savindhan Day, Birth and Death Anniversaries of national leaders etc. Students are provided basic skill development programmes and Personality Development programmes. In addition, field experience activities, guest lectures on developing scientific temtrament, environment awareness, anti-superstitious attitude etc have regularly been organized. Competitions like essay writing, elocution and debate etc, and speeches by eminent persons and guest lectures, seminars, workshops and extension lectures are conducted by various departments.

Faculties are highly proficient in their subject and have joined this noble profession with almost sincerity and seriousness. Faculty members are also constantly encouraged to pursue research work. Five faculty members are M. Phil and one Faculty member is Ph. D., Four are registered for Ph. D. They upgrade their knowledge through participation in conference, seminars and workshops. Teaching is planned considering ability and participation of students. Teaching methods like classroom teaching exercises, use of library, test examinations and personal laptop etc. are employed. It is also ensured that entire syllabus of each subject is properly completed in the classroom itself. Periods for Environment Science and General Knowledge are arranged. By taking feed-back from students, teaching process is duly verified.

Recently semester pattern has been introduced in the college in which internal examination has 10 marks and university examination has 40 marks.University examinations are conducted strictly as per the schedule in a highly disciplined manner. Real testing of student's knowledge is measured in entirely syllabus based University examinations. Answer books are checked under CAP. Results are displayed within stipulated time. In case of any grievance in respect of results, students have sufficient rights and means to solve them. After every university examination and its results through review is taken in the college. Extra classes are conducted for the slow learners. In the staff meeting all issues are discussed in detail. All meritorious students are duly felicitated in annual prize distribution function with trophy and meritorious certificate. During last years our students have obtained bright success they stood first second and third in university merit list. As per the vision and mission of the college every possible attempt is made to make each and every enrolled student of our college a successful individual. We honestly admit our challenge of dropout rate which is 40%. Only Arts faculty runs by the college. Near about 250 students are enrolled annually. First reason is our college is in rural area, which is an opportunity; and majority of female students who get married and they move to other places: the second concerns is that number of male students gets selected in police and other services, like clerical

departments, private companies or some are joined professional courses, rest of working as farmer. We positively state that we got succeeded to made 65% students' to complete their higher education.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The Research Committee of the College encourages faculty to register for M. Phil, Ph.D., to attend courses such as orientation, refresher, conferences, seminars and workshops. Our Principal is a recognized Research Guide in the subject Defence and Strategic Studies and Five faculty members are awarded M. Phil. degree. Four faculty members are pursuing Ph.D. The College arranged the National Conference. There is publication of 40 Research Paper of ISBN book on the occasion of national conference on "Movement of Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar's its Impact and Effect" by the Research Committee. Faculty members published Research papers in ISBN and ISSN books and Journals. Few departments discuss on different topics related to social, cultural, educational issues to develop critical thinking and scientific temper among the students. Guest lectures are arranged to promote research approach and research work among staff and students from time to time. The College organized university level T.Y.B.A.Defence and Strategic studies Syllabus Framing Workshop (2014) and arrange university level workshop on 'Qulity Improvement and Qulity base education In Defence Studies' in Same Subject(2017).Sutdent Wellfare Departement of College arrange University level Workshop on 'Impact of Global Warming on Environment' (2017). The eminent researchers are invited on behalf of the Staff Academy to deliver guest and extension lectures, demonstrate their research work and help in developing research aptitude. Faculty members are promoted to deliver speech on various subjects to various places by providing duty leave. Consultancy service are provided by allowing faculty member extend their expertise as facilitators for academy. The services are not intended to generate any revenue. The college promotes students to increase their participation in various extension activities. The NSS department conducted social awareness programmes, government assign work such as Nirmal Gram Yojana, Polio Awareness, Cleanliness Campaign, Save Girl Child, Tree Plantation, Water Conservation programmes and Sanvidhan Day. College invited eminent personalities such as Academicians, Social Activists, Politicians and well-known law officers to interact with students and have valuable guidance.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college situated at Annapurnadevi Vidya Prasark Sansth's Educational Complex in Thalner . In the complex Primary, High School, Jr. College and Sr. Arts College are situated. Primary and High Schools run in Afternoon and Jr. College and Sr. College run in the Morning in the same building. The building has ground floor and first floor. Working hours of college are from 7.20 am to 12.30pm. The College is on the first floor of the building with adequate infrastructure for academic, curricular, extracurricular and sports activities. The office and the library of the College are computerized and internet and Wi-Fi facility is also available. The college proposes to make separate rooms for NSS Unit, Recreational spaces –Indoor games, Reading Room etc. Safe drinking water facility is available. Equipment such as UPS, stabilizers, inverters, is acquired for voltage fluctuation and power failures. A round the clock water supply. There are separate lavatory facilities for the staff, girls and boys. Two wheeler, cycle and four wheeler parking space is available. CCTV cameras, ragging, grievance and redressesel, life insurance, medical checking all these facilities are available for security reason. Majority of our students come to the College everyday from their native villages.

The institution has financial provision for the maintenance of furniture equipment and computers. In the College campus more than 151 various types of trees and resently 45 plants

plantration. The central library contains text, reference books, journals and news papers. The library has text books, reference books, magazines and journals. The first-aid box is kept in the college premises. The institute has take connection of water supply of Gram Panchayat Thalner. The Clean and green campus is the precious asset of the institution. The college has created it's website with the URL as http://www.avpsthalner.org, have purchased Five computers, an inverter and a UPS, scanners and printers, licensed software, etc. to cope with the needs of academic work. The maintenance of all these things is done by well-known agencies on visit and pay basis. Our efforts are less for creating ICT zone, computer lab, and online resources by library: however some of students are qualified with state Government recognized basic computer courses such as MS-CIT.

Criterion V: Student, Support and Progression

Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities such as elocution, debate etc. activities on and off the campus. The College has a Carrier development and Guidance cell to guide, support and motivates students to appear in the competitive exams. Extension lectures and Guest Lectures on general mental ability are conducted. Faculty member guide and motivate students about the academic, personal, career. Students below average are supported by extra classes, counseling lectures etc.

The College disburses scholarship facilities to SC, ST, SBC, NT, OBC and minority students as sanctioned by the State governments. The college publishes annual magazine, runs wall paper writing, election for student council. There is sexual harassment cell, anti-ragging, student welfare department, NSS, Women Personality Development cell for female students run from last year. Alumni association is also functioning in the college. Four student represented at inter university sports activities. N.S.S. volunteers of the college are involved in various committees and activities. There are support to arrange various programme and activities.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The College Management has its key role in infrastructural development, providing financial resources, appointing required staff, enabling the faculty members for research activities etc. The Management encourages research among the staff. The Principal provides all necessary facilities to achieve the vision and mission of the college. There are 22 different committees formed for this purpose. The college is catering to the needs of the students, most of them who come from rural areas and economically weaker sections of the society to get higher education. The meetings with the faculty members are organized at least twice in a year. The College also has an organizational structure with a visionary Principal, supported by the heads of Departments, the Faculty, non-teaching staff and the class forth employees. All these employees co-operate and efficiently work upon the objectives of the institution and make its programme a success. The Principal form sinter action with the staff -teaching and non-teaching and the students, parents etc. from time to time. He holds meetings of each of these stake holders to build a healthy rapport of communication. The Principal along with the stake holders play an active role in organizing, planning, and monitoring the teaching-learning process and many other curricular, co curricular and extracurricular activities and programmes of the College. The leadership of the institution makes the budgetary provision for the academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The accounts of the college are regularly audited by the internal, external and Accounts General Office. The transparency is maintained in financial matters. The head clerk monitors the functioning of the office with the assistance of other office staff. The Principal with assistance of Head Clerk fixes the responsibility of office work and distributes the work among different sections and individuals of the office. The IQAC ensures academic excellence to improve the quality of education.

Criterion VII: Innovation and Best Practices

The College takes initiative to make campus eco-friendly. There are big windows and doors in each class room for better air circulation and proper light; hence it helps to save electricity a lot. It follows the policies of energy conservation, making choice for – CFL bulbs, creating awareness regarding water conservation through NSS activities. The College has brought out innovations which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College. It has renovated infrastructure, office automation and computerization, installation and up gradation of library.

From last years, the College has prepared Academic Diary for teachers to maintain the academic records of individual faculty. The Academic Diary has been proved quite innovative for the teaching-learning activities and research development purpose. The college has adopted two best practices for Empowerment and female students and Carrier Development Guidance Cell. Research culture is also a regular practice of our faculty member. Unique and innovative ways of teaching, learning and research are adopted by the institution directed towards all round development of students. The Students educated in this campus intermingle in the society by doing justice to their profession, building ideal families and molding a new generation with moral Value.

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
